WHEREAS: On January 1, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln issued the

Emancipation Proclamation, effectively banning the enslavement

of African Americans in the Southern States; and

**WHEREAS:** Following the surrender of Confederate troops and the end of the

United States Civil War, Emancipation was proclaimed in

Tallahassee, Florida on May 20, 1865; and

**WHEREAS:** Emancipation legally freed every African American citizen in the

state of Florida, banned the enslavement of African Americans, and ended the 246 years of Chattel Slavery in the Americas; and

WHEREAS: The enslavement of African Americans in the United States

remains one of the darkest periods of American history. While African Americans are granted equal rights under the 14<sup>th</sup> amendment, many African Americans continue to experience

systemic racial prejudice; and

**WHEREAS:** In 2021, Emancipation Day was declared a national holiday in the

United States. Citizens are encouraged to learn the history surrounding emancipation, explore what emancipation means to them, and acknowledge the need for further conversation and justice for systemically oppressed members of our community; and

**WHEREAS:** The City of Jacksonville is proud to celebrate Emancipation Day

and to honor the legacy and contributions of all those who came before and continue to work towards equality and justice for all.

**NOW, THEREFORE, I, LENNY CURRY,** by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor of Jacksonville, Florida, do hereby proclaim May 20, 2022 as

## **EMANCIPATION DAY**

in Jacksonville and encourage all citizens to become educated on the history of Emancipation Day and continue to advocate for equality and justice for all.
