

## PROCLAMATION

ONE CITY. ONE JACKSONVILLE

**WHEREAS:** National Crime Victims' Rights Week is recognized each April to ensure that all victims are afforded their rights and receive a trauma-informed response that promotes healing, fosters strength, and helps ease pain and suffering; and

**WHEREAS:** Each year, Americans are the victims of more than 20 million crimes which can lead to emotional, psychological, physical, and financial harm, with victims' pain often extending to loved ones and their communities; and

**WHEREAS:** Enacted by Congress in 1984, the Victims of Crime Act asserts a national commitment to helping crime victims rebuild their lives through acknowledgement and recognition their rights by treating them with dignity and respect; and

**WHEREAS:** Providing victims with knowledge of their rights and available services further strengthens their ability to recover by restoring a sense of self-empowerment; and

**WHEREAS:** Crime victims who feel understood and advocated for are more likely to divulge their victimization, seek services, and participate in the judicial process; and

**WHEREAS:** In Jacksonville, our community recognizes the importance of honoring the courageous victims and the professions who have made outstanding contributions to victims, making a difference in our community.

**NOW, THEREFORE, I, LENNY CURRY,** by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor of Jacksonville, Florida, do hereby proclaim April 18 – 24, 2021 as
