WHEREAS: By allowing the ability to move freely and safely from place to

place, the white cane makes it possible for the blind to fully

participate in and contribute to our society; and

WHEREAS: President Lyndon Johnson proclaimed the first official White

Cane Safety Day on October 15, 1964; and

WHEREAS: Every citizen should be aware that the law requires motorists

and cyclists to exercise appropriate caution when approaching a

blind pedestrian carrying a white cane; and

WHEREAS: The City of Jacksonville's Disabled Services Division supports

and advocates for the needs and rights of our blind citizens,

including working collaboratively with local organizations.

**NOW, THEREFORE, I, LENNY CURRY,** by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor of Jacksonville, Florida, do hereby proclaim October 15, 2020 as

in Jacksonville and encourage all citizens to recognize the white cane as a tool of independence and urge employers to open new opportunities for our blind community.
