WHEREAS: Hemophilia is a rare genetic disorder that prevents blood from

clotting properly due to lack of sufficient proteins, leading to symptoms such as excessive bleeding, deep bruising, joint pain,

muscle weakness and frequent nosebleeds; and

WHEREAS: If you have hemophilia, you may bleed for a longer time after an

injury than you would if your blood clotted normally, causing

weakness of the voluntary muscles; and

WHEREAS: Most people that suffer from hemophilia in the United States are

diagnosed at a young age: 36 months for mild cases, eight months

for moderate cases, and one month for severe cases; and

WHEREAS: The Bleeding Disorders Coalition of Florida (BDCF) is an advocacy

organization founded by the Hemophilia Foundation of Greater Florida and the Florida Hemophilia Association to be the voice of the Florida

bleeding disorders community; and

WHEREAS: The Bleeding Disorders Coalition of Florida has been serving the

bleeding disorders community to improve their quality of life by offering programs and services, such as a medically supervised camp, scholarships, advocacy efforts, emergency financial assistance, and educational programs to support healthier and more

independent lives.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LENNY CURRY, by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor of Jacksonville, Florida, do hereby proclaim March 2022 as

BLEEDING DISORDER AWARENESS MONTH

in Jacksonville and encourage all citizens to increase awareness of understanding of bleeding disorders and support efforts to improve quality of life for those affected.
