WHEREAS: The Jacksonville community resolves to work together to ensure all

citizens can receive the quality mental health and substance abuse treatment they need to succeed and live a productive and healthy life;

WHEREAS: Local law enforcement, first responders, mental health providers,

doctors, nurses, and other professionals across the city who tirelessly work to protect our communities are pivotal in Jacksonville's fight

against the overdose epidemic; and

**WHEREAS:** Statewide and locally, ISaveFL.com is a resource for residents to search

for providers in our community who offer free naloxone, a medication that can temporarily restore the breathing of someone experiencing an

opioid overdose while waiting for emergency medical services.
